Discussion during course/program approvals:

Jamey – When a course is being deleted because it hasn't been offered in several years, for whatever reason, a phrase like “This course no longer meets the needs of our students.” or “There is limited student demand for this course.” is better than “This course has not been offered in 10 years.” It should be clear why it was not offered and why it is now being deleted.

Eric – What number of years should a course not be offered before it should be deleted? FLC is deleting several courses that haven't been offered in many years or were never offered.

John – We have a senate-approved policy/process for this at FLC. We are in the process this year of cleaning up our catalog.

Bill asked Eric to send a copy to him to share with the other colleges.

Joe – Do the new FITNS 387 & 388 courses need a family?

Bill asked Eric to check with content experts at his college to see if they think the courses are closely enough related in content to need a family.

Bill – How do we handle a situation where the Board has approved a program but it was never approved by the CCCCO? ARC and SCC have them and need to do something about them.

Jamey – Can we have the board reaffirm their prior approval? Mary – You can use your local curriculum committee date for some things. Would that work here? The committee decided that the best plan is to catalog them, then launch a deletion so they can be formally deleted and have the deletions approved by the Board. A separate but related topic arose regarding 12-17.5 unit certificates that are being submitted for CCCCO approval years after Board approval. In that case, the Board will be asked to reaffirm their approval to get a more recent date to use for CCCCO submission.

b. Status of Collaboration Requests

Ready to Move: SPORT 366, CISW 370

EMT 100 is not ready but it needs to be in next catalog because of a change to Title 22. Right now, CRC and FLC have it at tech review status. Bill – We don't approve collaboration requests, we just coordinate them, so once those courses are at DCCC status they can be moved to catalog (please notify DCCC chair first). CRC & FLC will coordinate on this.

8. Updates from the District Jamey – NFN will change their process, having monthly calls for new programs on the first Thursday of each month (excluding July, August, and January). Applications are due two weeks ahead (by 15<sup>th</sup> of the month).

A new PPC list is coming out next Thursday. Jamey will send to Bill, who will send it to DCCC membership.

Mary – We had a very productive district-wide meeting this morning on CAI and multiple measures. Looking at Fall 2016/Spring 2017 implementation for SCC and CRC.

9. DAS Report Dan – Sue Lorimer and Jamey will be working with Senate presidents on CAI. Curriculum-related things at DAS: new LMS, dual enrollment, equivalencies to minimum qualifications.

#### 10. SAG Report

Phil is adding effective dates to programs. Most of the SAG meeting was spent on discussing and prioritizing (roughly 25) existing SAG requests.

#### 11. Music Courses Families

- a. MUIVI families (see attached list of families) Some of the proposed families do not need to be families because the courses in them are not really closely related in content. Joe will send out an updated list for the next DCCC meeting. The applied music courses (410 & 420's) are funded and run differently at the different colleges, so families really don't work for them. They will be removed from the current plan and we will try to tackle them later because they need more thought and conversation. (2<sup>nd</sup> reading next time for final approval.)
- b. MUP families – If an ensemble course is repeatable at the CSU system then it should be repeatable in the CC system. LACCD decided to not put their MUP courses into families because of this. Joe recommends that we do not put MUP courses into families. Dan – Do the CSUs have term limits? Lynn - Some CSUs have specific term requirements at their institution in their catalogs. If you were a native student there and needed more terms of the course, you would be counseled out of the major and into another degree program. Joe – CSULB says “each semester” without a limit. CSUS requires students to do it without credit if they have taken Ensemble too many times. (2<sup>nd</sup> reading next time for final approval.)

#### 12. Other

- a. Independent Study Courses – The idea to reduce the lower range of units to 0.5 was considered by the colleges but dropped when we determined there are too many downstream effects (CCCCO, ASSIST, PeopleSoft). For SCC, Phil Smith will change the existing courses to lab-only. FLC will do it manually instead of having Phil do it.
- b. Unnamed Thematic Blocks – already covered.
- c. Work Experience Repeatability Limitations in Socrates – LRCCD regulation R-7421, section 2.1.2 says occupational work experience can only be taken for 4 terms.
- d. Designator/Thematic Block Request Form – Lynn is still working on it. She needs some input on the new comment box size.
- e. Competency Committee Voting Form – Lynn is still working on it.

- f. Mary – ICW met yesterday. Two area-of-emphasis TMCs were released in February. Legislation requires four by December, so two more need to be created. Pre-law pathway AOE is possible. Also considering a general Humanities or a STEM major AOE. Draft PCAH (version 6) will be released at the Curriculum Institute this summer, and possibly a draft will be release later this spring for comments.
