5. AB 361 Virtual Meetings – (Council Members Vote in the Chat)
 - On September 16, 2021, Governor Newsom signed AB 361, which amended the Brown Act to provide local legislative bodies the ability to conduct virtual meetings under certain circumstances. The legislation included an urgency clause, which made it effective immediately. AB 361 allows local legislative bodies to conduct virtual meetings during a state of emergency proclaimed by the Governor under certain conditions, including when “the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of members to meet safely in person.”
 - If the state of emergency is ongoing, the local legislative body must adopt certain findings by majority vote every thirty days in order to continue using the virtual meeting rules under AB 361.
 - RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the Los Rios Ethnic Studies Faculty Council adopt the finding “the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of members to meet safely in person.” And consents to meeting virtually.

These sovereign people have been the caretakers of the health of the rivers, the wildlife, the plant life, and the overall eco-social balance in the greater Sacramento region since time immemorial.

Despite centuries of genocide and occupation, the Nisenan, Maidu, and Miwok continue as vibrant and resilient tribes and bands, both Federally recognized and unrecognized. Tribal citizens of these nations continue to be an active and important part of our Los Rios college community. We take this opportunity to acknowledge the land and our responsibility to the original peoples, the present-day Nisenan, Maidu, and Miwok tribal nations.

Delta College Land Statement

We acknowledge that San Joaquin Delta College serves students and the community on the unceded ancestral homeland of indigenous peoples, including the Yokuts [yoh-kuts], Plains Mi- Wuk [mee-wuck], Patwin [PAT-win], and Nisenan [nish-n-non]. This land remains inseparable from its aboriginal stewards.

As guests, we recognize that we benefit from living and working on their traditional homeland, and we wish to pay our respects by acknowledging the ancestors, elders and relatives of the Yokuts [yoh-kuts], Plains Mi-Wuk [mee-wuck], Patwin [PAT-win], and Nisenan, including by affirming their sovereign rights as First Peoples.

We remain grateful for the rich culture, languages, contributions, and heritage of the First Nation peoples who lived here and loved here, who raised their families here, who cared for land and life here, who are buried in many marked and unmarked places here, and who remain here despite acts of genocide, assimilation, and forced removal. Let us honor them, this land, and all life in our thoughts, words, and actions in this place.

New Proposed Goals of the Council

We propose that the Los Rios Community College District Ethnic Studies Faculty Council (LRCCDESFC) continue as a subcommittee under the Los Rios Community College District Academic Senate. In this capacity, the LRCCDESFC will be charged with the following tasks:

1. collaborate on the development of consistent and interdependent Ethnic Studies programs, degrees, courses and class schedules
 - Development of new courses
 - Area F Approval for all Ethnic Studies courses
 - Common Course Numbering (AB1111)
 - Transfer Model Curriculum requirements & AD-T development (New Common GE Pattern AB928)
 - AA in Ethnic Studies
 - AA in each of the 4 Core Areas
 - Dual Enrollment & Professional Development for Teachers
 - Research and possible development of a Teaching Certificate
 - Collaborative class scheduling
2. assist in efforts to increase enrollments of BIPOC students districtwide
 - lead efforts to increase BIPOC student Dual Enrollment to address equity issues
3. assist in efforts to increase the numbers of BIPOC faculty
 - provide onboarding professional development opportunities for new faculty
4. create and provide professional development opportunities districtwide & statewide
5. build community & connections in the district, region, statewide and nationally through involvement with various organizations
 - Local Academic Senates, Curriculum Committees and other local college committees
 - District Academic Senate, District Curriculum Committee and other districtwide committees
 - Academic Senate of California Community Colleges (ASCCC)
 - Involvement in the Course Identification Numbering System (C-ID) through the Faculty Discipline Review Groups (FDRG) to develop the Transfer Model Curriculum (TMC) and the Associates Degree for Transfer (AD-T)
